**RECONCILIATION/CONFESSIONE:** One half-hour prior to weekend Mass or by request/appointment.

**MATRIMONY/MATRIMONIO:** Arrangements should be made at least six or more months in advance. A marriage preparation program is required.

SACRAMENT OF THE SICK/INFERMI: In cases of emergencies, please call anytime. Please notify the Parish Office for Communion calls to the sick, shut-ins. Due to privacy laws, if parishioners wish to be visited in the hospital, they should contact the Parish Office directly and give the information regarding the hospitalization. If you are scheduled for surgeries or other medical procedures, please contact the Parish Office in advance so that a priest can administer Anointing of the Sick prior to the procedure.

## **ORDER OF CHRISTIAN INITIATION OF ADULTS:**

The process in which adults enter the **Roman Catholic Church** is known as **OCIA**, **"The Order of Christian Initiation of Adults." Who is eligible for this process?** 

<u>The Unbaptized.</u> The primary focus of the Order of Christian Initiation of Adults is on those who are not already Christian and have had little or no religious education.

Baptized, but un-catechized are those who have been baptized in the Roman Catholic Church, but need further catechetical instruction to celebrate the Sacraments of Reconciliation, Confirmation, and the Holy Eucharist. Those Seeking Full Communion with the Catholic Church are baptized, practicing Christians from another Christian Tradition who seek entry, or full communion with the Roman Catholic Church.

# O Antiphons \o 'an-tə-fəns\

From Greek meaning "sounding against," seven short scripture verses, sung or chanted at Vespers, often in divided choirs, during the week before Christmas, December 17 to 23. Each Antiphon invokes Christ by means of an Old Testament symbol: O Wisdom, O Sacred Lord, O Flower of Jesse's Stem, O Key of David, O Radiant Dawn, O King of All Nations, and O Emmanuel.

The **O Antiphons** proclaim the coming Christ as the fulfillment not only of Old Testament hopes, but our present desires as well.

## WHY IT MATTERS

It's tempting to treat the two Testaments of our Bible as the "before" and "after" of religious understanding for Christianity. In the contemplation of the great **O Antiphons**, we discover that the divine revelation we recognize as Jesus has been within the story of God's people from the beginning.

From *Learning from the O Antiphons* by C.C. Pecknold: The O Antiphons were certainly in regular use by the time of Charlemagne in the eighth century. "They prepare us for the great Vigil of Christmas, uniting Israel's hopes and the desire of nations as a kind of prophetic *summa* in praise of divine providence. In the heart of winter's darkness, the O Antiphons call us to worship Jesus Christ as the center of salvation history."

#### What are the O Antiphons?

The O Antiphons (also known as the Great Advent Antiphons or Great Os) are sung verses used in evening prayer during the last seven days of Advent (December 17-23) at the beginning and end of the Magnificat, a hymn of praise spoken by Mary. Rendered in order, in Latin and English, the **O Antiphons** are: *O Sapientia* (O Wisdom), *O* Adonai (O Lord), O Radix Jesse (O Root of Jesse), O Clavis Davidica (O Key of David), O Oriens (O Radiant Dawn), O Rex Gentium (O King of Nations), and O Emmanuel (O Godwith-us). As an acrostic, the Latin version reads SARCORE, reversed as ero cras ("I will be tomorrow"). Since the Antiphons are traditionally chanted December 17-23, Jesus is literally born "tomorrow" at the chant's conclusion. The O Antiphons have been around at least since the eighth century, when monks would sing them. Even if you don't pray the Liturgy of the Hours, these Antiphons may sound familiar. This is because they were incorporated into one of the bestknown hymns of the Advent season: "O Come, O Come Emmanuel."
